ROAD TRAFFIC REGULATION ACT 1984

THE A23 GLA ROAD (LONDON ROAD) (LONDON BOROUGH OF CROYDON) BANNED TURN TRAFFIC ORDER 2023

THE A200 GLA ROAD AND SIDE ROAD (JAMAICA ROAD AND WEST LANE, LONDON BOROUGH OF SOUTHWARK) BANNED TURNS TRAFFIC ORDER 2023

1. Transport for London hereby gives notice that on 16th June 2023 it made the above named Orders, under section 6 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984. The Orders will come into force on 26th June 2023.
2. The general nature and effect of the Orders will be to formalise the existing
 - (1) prohibition of all vehicles proceeding on Colliers Water Lane from turning right onto the A23 GLA Road London Road.
 - (2) prohibition of all vehicles, except pedal cycles turning right into the bi-directional cycle track at the north side of Jamaica Road, from turning right from West Lane into the A200 Jamaica Road;
 - (3) permission for all vehicles to turn left from West Lane into Jamaica Road and to proceed directly from West Lane into Southwark Park Road;
 - (4) prohibition of all vehicles from turning right from the A200 Jamaica Road into West Lane or Southwark Park Road. This provision is for administrative purposes only.
3. The roads which would be affected by the Orders are the A23 London Road, A 200 Jamaica Road, West Lane and Southwark Park Road in the London Boroughs of Croydon and Southwark.
4. Any person wishing to question the validity of the Order or of any of its provisions on the grounds that they are not within the relevant powers conferred by the Act or that any requirement of the Act has not been complied with, that person may, within six weeks from the date on which the Order is made, make application for the purpose to the High Court.
